



MURRAY CITY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

The Murray City Municipal Council met on Tuesday, February 16, 2021 for a meeting held electronically in accordance with the provisions of Utah Code 52-4-207(4), Open and Public Meeting Act, due to infectious disease COVID-19 Novel Coronavirus. Council Chair, Ms. Turner, determined that to protect the health and welfare of Murray citizens, an in-person City Council meeting, including attendance by the public and the City Council is not practical or prudent.

Ms. Turner called the meeting to order at 5:15 p.m.

Approval of Minutes – Ms. Turner asked for comments or a motion on the minutes from Committee of the Whole – January 19, 2021. Mr. Cox moved approval. Mr. Hales seconded the motion. (Approved 5-0)

Discussion Items

FY (Fiscal Year) 2020-2021 Budget Amendment – (Attachment #1) Ms. Moore reviewed all proposed modifications to amend the FY 20-21 budget that included grant funding and donations; GF (General Fund) increases, and appropriations; CIP (Capital Improvement Projects) Fund allocations from reserves; and other budget transfers. She discussed and confirmed all budget requests that were previously reviewed in detail at the mid-year budget meeting held on January 26, 2021; she noted that grant funding received did not affect the City's current reserves in any way. She confirmed money previously cut from CIP budgets would be going back into the fund to move various projects and purchases forward.

The proposed ordinance would be considered at the March 2, 2021 council meeting during a public hearing. There were no questions or concerns from Council Members.

Open and Public Meeting Act Training – Mr. Critchfield explained the purpose of the annual training was

to review the Open and Public Meeting Act requirements that applies to all municipal governments. The training is required by State law. To view the training in full visit:

Mr. Critchfield reviewed the declaration of the public policy, which ensures that all actions and deliberations of the City Council are conducted openly, and held in public view, for public observation. He described the meaning of a “meeting” which is the convening of the City Council with a quorum; chance gatherings and social gatherings are not considered “meetings” unless city issues are being discussed. He reminded the Council that three Council Members together is considered a quorum.

Mr. Critchfield spoke in detail about State Law requirements for notifying the public on regularly scheduled public meetings; agenda requirements; closed meetings; and the reasoning for having a closed meeting. Training occurred about the recording and documenting of all meetings that results in written minutes for public access. He discussed procedures for holding electronic meetings; two types were noted: those with an anchor location; and those without an anchor location that include public involvement. Requirements about enforcement were outlined related to; public disruptions, voidable final actions determined by a judge; public and private enforcement; and closed meeting violations. Mr. Critchfield affirmed Utah’s heritage of transparency, as the first state to pass the Sunshine Law in 1898, which means that the business of a public body would be conducted in public, where citizens may attend, observe, or scrutinize; this was the very first Open and Public Meeting Act to be enacted.

In closing, he shared a statement written by a deceased federal judge who presided over Ohio, Michigan, Kentucky, and Tennessee that said: *“When government begins closing doors, it selectively controls information rightfully belonging to the people. Selective information is misinformation.”* Mr. Critchfield said the quote held an important focus to remember, which was that just because public information comes only to the Council - because they are public servants – public information actually and rightfully belongs to the people. He pointed out that democracies die behind closed doors.

Mr. Hales noted whether Council Members can or cannot discuss with citizens their citizen comments during the public comment segment of a council meeting - if comments did not pertain to the current agenda. Mr. Critchfield clarified the rule is that Council Members are only allowed to discuss items on the agenda. There is the exception that if a citizen brings up something not on the agenda, Council Members are allowed to discuss concerns - only at the discretion of the presiding chairperson. He advised it was not a great practice to respond to every citizen comment; and occasionally they may want to engage, but during this time of conversation decisions cannot be made about issues.

Mr. Hales asked whether the opening statement must be read – indicating that there was no anchor location - when in actuality the anchor location was split; he pointed out that currently some Council Members were utilizing Zoom to attend and others were in-person at city hall, which was an anchor location. Mr. Critchfield explained the chambers was not to be considered an anchor location because the public was still not able to attend in-person, due to the pandemic. An anchor location includes a quorum combined with the ability to accommodate the public in-person. There were no questions from Council Members.

Harassment Training – Mr. Critchfield shared a power point to conduct the training; he noted Article IV, Sections A and B of the Murray Municipal Council Rules for reference; and utilized the City’s Anti-Harassment Policy to discuss the topic; to watch the entire presentation visit:

Mr. Critchfield discussed how someone should report discriminatory behavior and harassment; and pointed out rule nine in the Council Rules to establish that the City would foster and maintain a work environment that is free from discrimination and intimidation; which is also applicable to the City Council. He reviewed how harassment is properly defined, and what harassing conduct looks like more specifically. Training about sexual harassment; unwelcomed conduct, and the victimization of either gender was discussed comparatively. Examples of inappropriate conduct were listed; Federal and State Laws were noted that protect individuals from discrimination based upon sex. Important steps were noted about reporting inappropriate conduct, and the process to document and investigate harassment cases promptly. Corrective action: and the ramifications of having no retaliation against anyone who makes a complaint or cooperates in an investigation was covered. Council Members had no questions or comments following the training.

Legislative Updates – (Attachment #2 and #3) Ms. Martinez expressed appreciation for Mayor Camp's Intern, Mr. Daily who provided a summary sheet of the 2021 Legislative Session (Week 4: February 8-12, 2021) that she shared with the Council. She discussed House and Senate bills impacting Murray City; discussed legislation noted by the Utah League of Cities and Towns important to cities. She identified whether bills were supported or opposed by each entity and provided the current status of others.

Mr. Critchfield added insight to provide more clarity about the following bills:

- HB-0076 - Firearms Preemption Amendments. He explained a city cannot pass a law contradicting State Law; and since a couple of entities had existing contradictory policies related to firearms, the bill was created to clarify that cities cannot go against State Law.
- HB-0082 - Single-Family Housing Modifications - (An ADU (Accessory Dwelling Unit) issue.) Ms. Martinez noted the bill was opposed by the ULCT that proposes cities cannot regulate or restrict ADUs in certain ways. Mr. Critchfield confirmed negotiations are still underway; and led a discussion to explain Murray passed an ADU ordinance years ago that requires the home must be occupied by the owner; there must be two additional off-street parking spaces; and ADUs are confined to a limited number of square feet. In an effort to provide more housing in Utah ADU's became a priority this year. As a result, the State now proposes to lift restrictions that cities have put in place; he believed legislation could change Murray's parking requirement to providing only one parking space instead of two. He said the City may not agree with proposed legislation when it comes to housing, but their goal is to make it more affordable for people to live in Salt Lake City.
- SB0013 - Law Enforcement and Internal Investigation Requirements. Mr. Critchfield reported that currently, if there is an internal affairs investigation and a person resigns before the investigation is complete, the case is considered over. The bill is intended that an officer who has a problem, cannot move on to the next jurisdiction; the record would follow the officer even if the investigation is not finished. Ms. Turner affirmed investigative records currently do not follow police officers.

Council Members had no further discussion.

Ms. Martinez reported her good conversations with several senators; she said with the continued 2021 Legislative Session, she would provide another update at the next council meeting.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY'S FISCAL YEAR 2020-2021 BUDGET

On June 16, 2020, the Murray City Municipal Council adopted the City's budget for Fiscal Year 2020-2021. It has been proposed that the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget be amended as follows:

1. Receive and appropriate the following grants and/or donations in the General Fund with no financial impact:
 - a. \$1,000 in donations from police officers beard growing donations for the victim advocates emergency funds, and;
 - b. \$3,600 Utah Department of Health CARES grant for a Kids Zone mobile room divider, and;
 - c. \$1,451 Utah Department of Health EMS grant for emergency medical equipment, and;
 - d. \$11,787 Health and Human Services provider relief grant for the purchase of a handsfree CPR device, and;
 - e. \$5,000 Create in Utah CARES grant for arts programming.
2. Receive and appropriate the following revenue & expenditures in the General Fund with no financial impact:
 - a. Receive \$147,400 from additional sales tax revenue, and;
 - b. Appropriate \$36,900 in the City Council personnel expenses, due to the council director personnel change, and;
 - c. Appropriate \$100,000 in the IT small equipment expenses, for computer replacements, and;
 - d. Appropriate \$7,000 in the Police travel and learning, for increased training needs, and;
 - e. Appropriate \$2,500 in the City Council professional services budget for public meeting broadcast services, and;
 - f. Appropriate \$1,000 in the City Council miscellaneous expense for Fun Days parade taffy.

3. Appropriate the following from Capital Improvement Projects Fund reserves:
 - a. \$40,000 for a truck for the Parks department, and;
 - b. \$45,000 for repair and replacement of the Senior Recreation center HVAC system, and;
 - c. \$292,000 for Police cars and related equipment, and;
 - d. \$25,000 for radar speed signs, and;
 - e. \$20,000 for professional services to complete the Cities transportation plan, and;
 - f. \$200,000 for the Hanauer street extension to complete landscaping and lighting, and;
 - g. \$47,360 transfer to the Golf Course Fund for equipment.
4. Receive and appropriate in the Golf Course Fund \$47,360 for 2 sand trap raking machines, and a golf cart lift.
5. Appropriate \$379,775 in the Golf Course Fund from reserves for Golf Carts.
6. Appropriate \$100,000 in the Risk Fund from reserves for professional services due to litigation expenses.
7. Authorize the Director of Finance and Administration to transfer any amount the transportation sales tax revenue is above budget to the Capital Projects fund at the close of the fiscal year 2020-2021 and adjust the budget accordingly.
8. Authorize the Director of Finance and Administration to transfer any amount from the General Fund to the Capital Projects fund at the close of fiscal year 2020-2021 any amount which exceeds the maximum fund balance as determined by Utah Code Ann section 10-6-116, and adjust the budget accordingly.

Section 10-6-128 of the Utah Code states that the budget for the City may be amended by the Murray City Municipal Council following a duly noticed public hearing. Pursuant to proper notice, the Murray City Municipal Council held a public hearing on March 2, 2021 to consider proposed amendments to the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget. After considering public comment, the Murray City Municipal Council wants to amend the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget.

Section 1. Enactment. The City's Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget shall be amended as follows:

9. Receive and appropriate the following grants and/or donations in the General Fund with no financial impact:

- a. \$1,000 in donations from police officers beard growing donations for the victim advocates emergency funds, and;
- b. \$3,600 Utah Department of Health CARES grant for a Kids Zone mobile room divider, and;
- c. \$1,451 Utah Department of Health EMS grant for emergency medical equipment, and;
- d. \$11,787 Health and Human Services provider relief grant for the purchase of a handsfree CPR device, and;
- e. \$5,000 Create in Utah CARES grant for arts programming.

10. Receive and appropriate the following revenue & expenditures in the General Fund with no financial impact:

- a. Receive \$147,400 from additional sales tax revenue, and;
- b. Appropriate \$36,900 in the City Council personnel expenses, due to the council director personnel change, and;
- c. Appropriate \$100,000 in the IT small equipment expenses, for computer replacements, and;
- d. Appropriate \$7,000 in the Police travel and learning, for increased training needs, and;
- e. Appropriate \$2,500 in the City Council professional services budget for public meeting broadcast services, and;
- f. Appropriate \$1,000 in the City Council miscellaneous expense for Fun Days parade taffy.

11. Appropriate the following from Capital Improvement Projects Fund reserves:

- a. \$40,000 for a truck for the Parks department, and;
- b. \$45,000 for repair and replacement of the Senior Recreation center HVAC system, and;
- c. \$292,000 for Police cars and related equipment, and;

- d. \$25,000 for radar speed signs, and;
 - e. \$20,000 for professional services to complete the Cities transportation plan, and;
 - f. \$200,000 for the Hanauer street extension to complete landscaping and lighting, and;
 - g. \$47,360 transfer to the Golf Course Fund for equipment.
12. Receive and appropriate in the Golf Course Fund \$47,360 for 2 sand trap raking machines, and a golf cart lift.
 13. Appropriate \$379,775 in the Golf Course Fund from reserves for Golf Carts.
 14. Appropriate \$100,000 in the Risk Fund from reserves for professional services due to litigation expenses.
 15. Authorize the Director of Finance and Administration to transfer any amount the transportation sales tax revenue is above budget to the Capital Projects fund at the close of the fiscal year 2020-2021 and adjust the budget accordingly.
 16. Authorize the Director of Finance and Administration to transfer any amount from the General Fund to the Capital Projects fund at the close of fiscal year 2020-2021 any amount which exceeds the maximum fund balance as determined by Utah Code Ann section 10-6-116, and adjust the budget accordingly.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect on first publication.

Summary for the 2021 Legislative Session (Week 4: Feb 8-Feb 12)

Murray City:

HB0017 (Rep. Handy/Sen. Hinkins) – Utility Permitting Amendments: **Oppose**

- Municipalities can't restrict any utility services based on the type of utility (There has been an amendment and ULCT has changed their position to neutral).
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state or local government.
- SIGNED BY THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE AND SENT FOR ENROLLING ON FRI, FEB. 12

HB0023 (Rep. Nelson/Sen. Sandall) – Voter Referendum Amendments: **Support**

- "Land Use Law" includes property rezoning, "Local Law" includes property zoning, Voter referendums passed after April 15 can still get on the ballot if approved by sponsors, local clerk, and attorney or municipality who took action.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state or local government.
- CURRENTLY WITH SENATE JUDICIARY, LAW ENFORCEMENT, AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE – ON AGENDA FOR TUE, FEB. 16 @ 8 AM – ITEM #10.

HB0028 (Rep. Handy/Sen. Anderegg) – Land Use and Eminent Domain Advisory Board Amendments: **Support**

- Repeals the sunset date for the Land Use and Eminent Domain Advisory Board.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state or local government.
- SIGNED BY THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE AND SENT FOR ENROLLING ON MON, FEB. 8

HB0063 (Rep. Pierucci/Sen. Fillmore) – Impact Fees Amendments: **Support**

- Can use "Expense for Overhead" when calculating impact fees.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state government. Local government revenue could change, but aggregate measure is unknown.
- CURRENTLY ON SENATE 2ND READING CALENDAR – ITEM #22 – PLACED THERE THU, FEB. 11

HB0076 (Rep. Maloy) – Firearm Preemption Amendments: **Oppose**

- State has sole authority to regulate firearms and make exceptions, defines consequences of violation.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact. Could cost local entities money for litigation.
- 1ST READING INTRODUCED TO HOUSE – CURRENTLY STILL WITH HOUSE RULES COMMITTEE

HB0082 (Rep. Ward/Sen. Anderegg) – Single-Family Housing Modifications (ADU issue): **Oppose**

- Municipalities cannot regulate ADU's or restrict number of individuals in a household to anything less than 4 individuals (3 if municipality is within boundaries of a University).

- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact for FY2021, -\$505,700 for FY2022, and -\$500,000 for FY2023 (-\$500,000 ongoing money and -\$5,700 for one-time money). No additional funding, but a reallocation of existing funding. Not likely to have a direct fiscal impact on local government.
- CURRENTLY CIRCLED ON HOUSE 3RD READING CALENDAR – ITEM #14 – PLACED THERE FRI, FEB. 12

HB0098 (Rep. Ray) – Local Government Building Regulation Amendments: Oppose

- Construction can opt out of independent inspections or hire their own inspector; municipalities can't restrict certain design elements; and if a building was damaged by a natural disaster, repairs are exempt from certain code requirements.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state government. Local governments could lose approximately \$1,500 in fee revenue for each instance of opt-out, aggregate impact is unknown.
- CURRENTLY WITH HOUSE POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS COMMITTEE – PLACED THERE MON, FEB. 5 – NOT ON AGENDA YET.

SB0061 (Sen. Sandall) – Outdoor Advertising Amendments: Oppose

- Restricts municipalities' ability to regulate placement, brightness, and other elements of outdoor advertising signs and billboards.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state or local government.
- CURRENTLY CIRCLED ON SENATE 2ND READING CALENDAR – ITEM #5 – SUBSTITUTED AND CIRCLED ON FRI, FEB. 12.

ULCT:

HB0066 (Rep. Snider) – Sheriffs Amendments: Oppose

- Sherriff has authority over local police department if they disagree on enforcement of riot, civil disturbance, and breach of peace.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state or local government.
- 1ST READING INTRODUCED TO HOUSE – CURRENTLY STILL WITH HOUSE RULES COMMITTEE

HB0096 (Rep. Harrison/Sen. McKell) – Emergency Management Amendments: Support

- Political Subdivisions appoint an emergency manager and create an emergency operations plan, and state agencies have to consult with the Division of Emergency Management before taking on construction projects. State Disaster Recovery account's earned interest to be deposited back into the account.
- From General Fund to Disaster Recovery Fund: \$6,000 in FY2021; \$72,000 in FY2022; and \$72,000 in FY2023. No net increase or decrease in state costs or revenues. No direct fiscal impact on local governments.

- SENATE RECEIVED FROM HOUSE – CURRENTLY WITH SENATE RULES COMMITTEE – PLACED THERE FRI, FEB 5.

HB0107 (Rep. Ferry/Sen. Owens) – Subdivision Plat Amendments: No recommendation yet

- Surveyors must specify water conveyance facilities entirely within, or within 100 feet of the proposed plat and notify the owner of the water conveyance facility of the proposed plat.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state or local government.
- SENATE RECEIVED FROM HOUSE AND SENT TO RULES COMMITTEE FRI, FEB. 12.

SB0013 (Sen. Iwamoto/Rep. Wilcox) – Law Enforcement Internal Investigation Requirements: Support

- requires that an employing agency notify the Peace Officer Standards and Training Division if a peace officer separates from the agency while an investigation is in progress, investigation must be turned over to the division in certain circumstances.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state or local government.
- SIGNED BY SENATE PRESIDENT AND SENT FOR ENROLLING THU, FEB. 11.

SB0058 (Sen. Mayne/Rep. Dunnigan) – Metro Township Amendments: Support

- repeals provisions restricting a Metro Townships ability for energy sales and use tax, and allows a metro township to impose an energy sales and use tax or a telecommunication's license tax.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state government. Local government could see \$500,000 in aggregate revenues assuming statutory maximum energy and telecommunications taxes are levied.
- SENT TO HOUSE POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS COMMITTEE WED, FEB. 10 – ON AGENDA FOR WED, FEB. 17 @ 9 AM – ITEM #1

SB0065 (Sen. Harper/Rep. Handy) – Community Reinvestment Agency Amendments: No position

- agencies can levy a property tax on property within the agency's boundaries, and restricts the agency from widening the scope of some project plans or project budgets, and agency can use property tax revenue for agency projects.
- Estimated \$0 direct fiscal impact on state government. Local government could lose tax revenue when entering into interlocal agreements, aggregate impact unknown.
- SENT TO SENATE GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS AND POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS COMMITTEE ON 1/19 – NOT ON AGENDA YET.
